


Land Acknowledgement

"We acknowledge York Region is located on the traditional territory of many Indigenous peoples such as the Anishinaabe, Haudenosaunee, Huron-Wendat and Métis peoples and the treaty territories of the Huadenosaunee, the Williams Treaties First Nations, and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

York Region falls under the Nanfan Treaty with the Haudenosaunee, Treaty 13 with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, and the Williams Treaties with the Chippewas of Beausoleil, Georgina Island and Rama First Nations and the Mississaugas of Alderville, Curve Lake, Hiawatha and Scugog Island First Nations.


There are also other land claims and treaty rights involving portions of York Region that have not been resolved. The Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation is the closest First Nation community to York Region. We thank these and other Indigenous peoples for sharing their land with us."




Background

- History and purpose of York Region's Sign Bylaw
- In 2022, a formal review of the Bylaw was undertaken in consultation with local area municipalities
- Public safety, enforcement and sign pollution were identified as key themes to address



Background (continued)

- Initial report taken to Regional Council in May
- Staff requested to further reduce impacts of signs
- Additional stakeholder input (Public Information Meeting)




Current Bylaw — Where Are Signs Permitted

- Temporary signs are currently permitted at over 1,900 designated intersections in areas shown in green on the diagram
- Permit stickers are issued and must be attached to the sign
- Fees are charged per permit
- Election signs may be subject to a one-time fee




Total number of signs approved 2020-2024



Number of signs has increased over 140% since 2020



Balancing Signs and Growth

- Vision Zero Traveller
 Safety Plan
 (york.ca/TravellerSafetyPlan)
- Busier roads
- Complex infrastructure
- Limited space



Proposed Reduction of Signs

Available intersections reduced to approximately 700

Reductions include:

- Existing restricted intersections
- Rapid transit areas
- High speed locations (80 km/h)
- High collision intersections
- Tightly spaced intersections/narrow boulevards

Other Proposed Changes

- Only A-frame and stake signs are permitted for
 - Business navigation
 - Real estate open houses
 - Development navigation
 - Election signs
- Sign permit stickers must face the road for visibility









Fees/Permits

- Subject to Regional Council's approval:
 - The annual permit fee is proposed to be marginally increased to support enforcement and offset cost
 - Annual number of signs per permit is proposed to be reduced
 - One time election sign permit fee per candidate proposed to be administered by the Region




Your Input
