

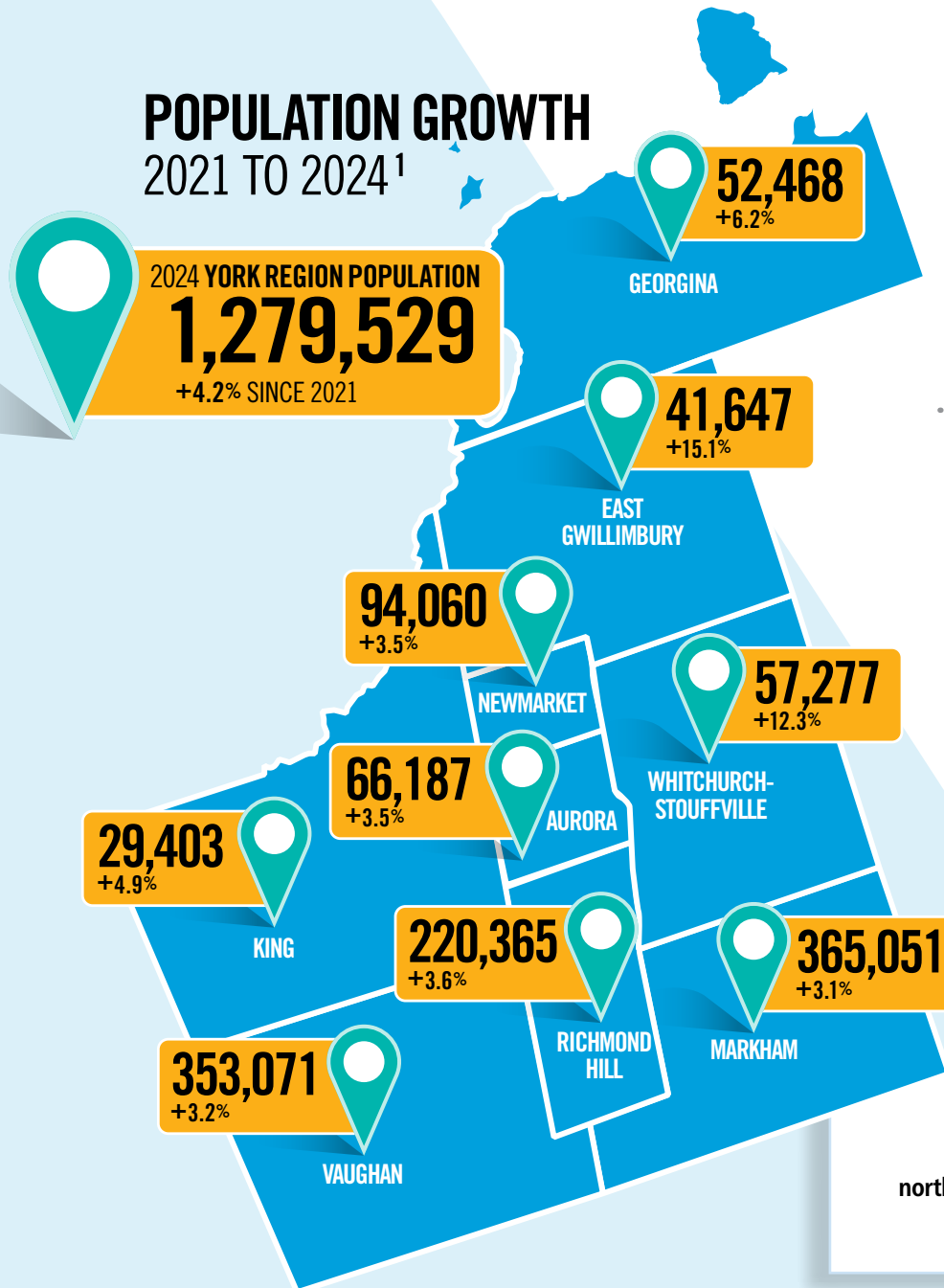
York Region's Growing, Aging, and Diversifying Population

Understanding population and demographic shifts in York Region is critical for effective planning, policy development, and advocacy, especially when focusing on poverty reduction and housing stabilization.

This Bulletin presents key data and trends from the *2024 York Region Health and Well-Being Review* and beyond, highlighting how the Region's population is growing, aging and diversifying. These changes are shaping local needs, service demands and community priorities.

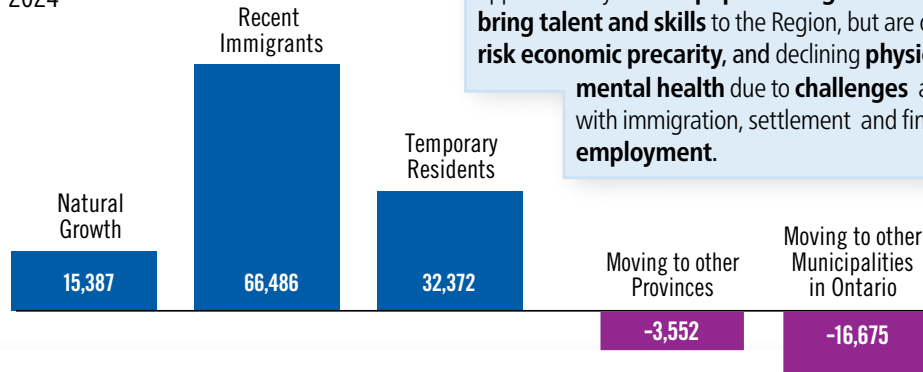
Bulletin 1 is part of a three-part series and aims to enable service providers, policymakers and advocates to make evidence-informed decisions that advance equity, stability and long-term well-being across York Region.

73% of York Region's population resides within the **three southern municipalities**. The **six northern municipalities** are also growing, with an **increase of 10% between 2021 and 2024**.



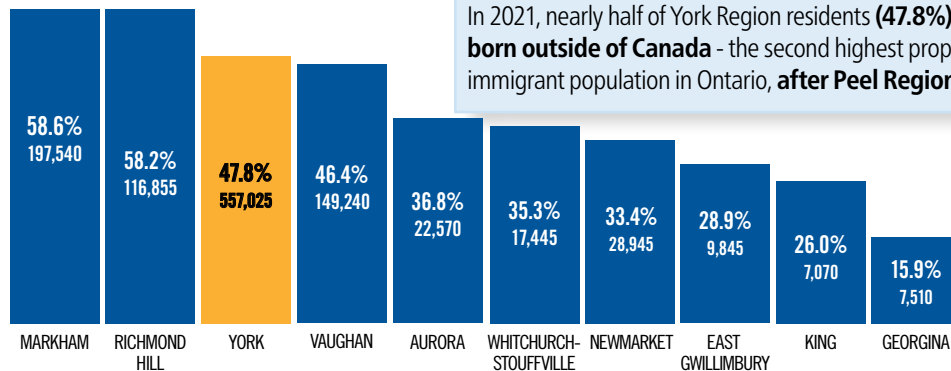

YORK REGION POPULATION GROWTH AND CHANGE 2019 TO 2024²



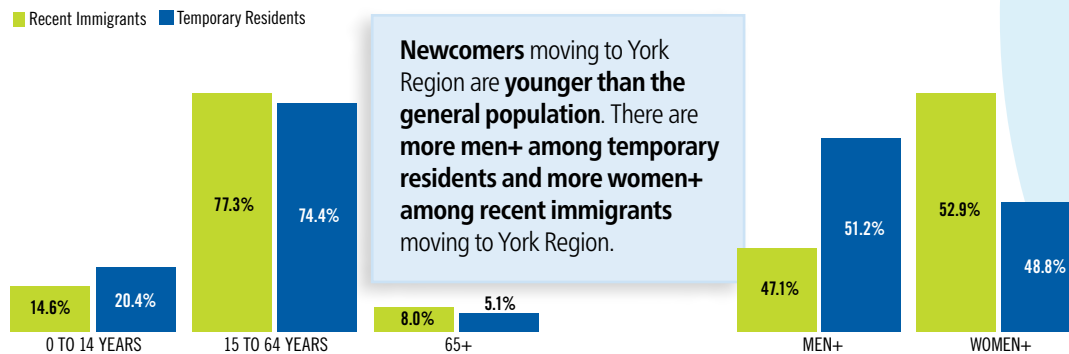
Newcomers drive population growth in York Region. From 2019 to 2024, over **66,000 recent immigrants** moved to York Region, representing approximately **71% of population growth**. Newcomers bring talent and skills to the Region, but are often at risk economic precarity, and declining physical and mental health due to challenges associated with immigration, settlement and finding employment.

In 2021, nearly half of York Region residents (**47.8%**) were **born outside of Canada** - the second highest proportion of immigrant population in Ontario, **after Peel Region (51.8%)**.

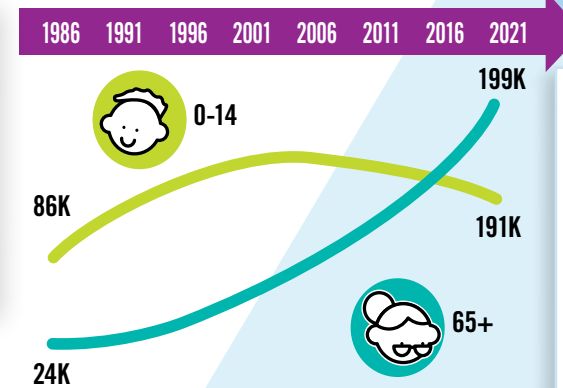
AGE AND GENDER OF NEWCOMERS TO CANADA 2019 TO 2024⁶



Newcomers moving to York Region are **younger than the general population**. There are **more men+ among temporary residents** and **more women+ among recent immigrants** moving to York Region.

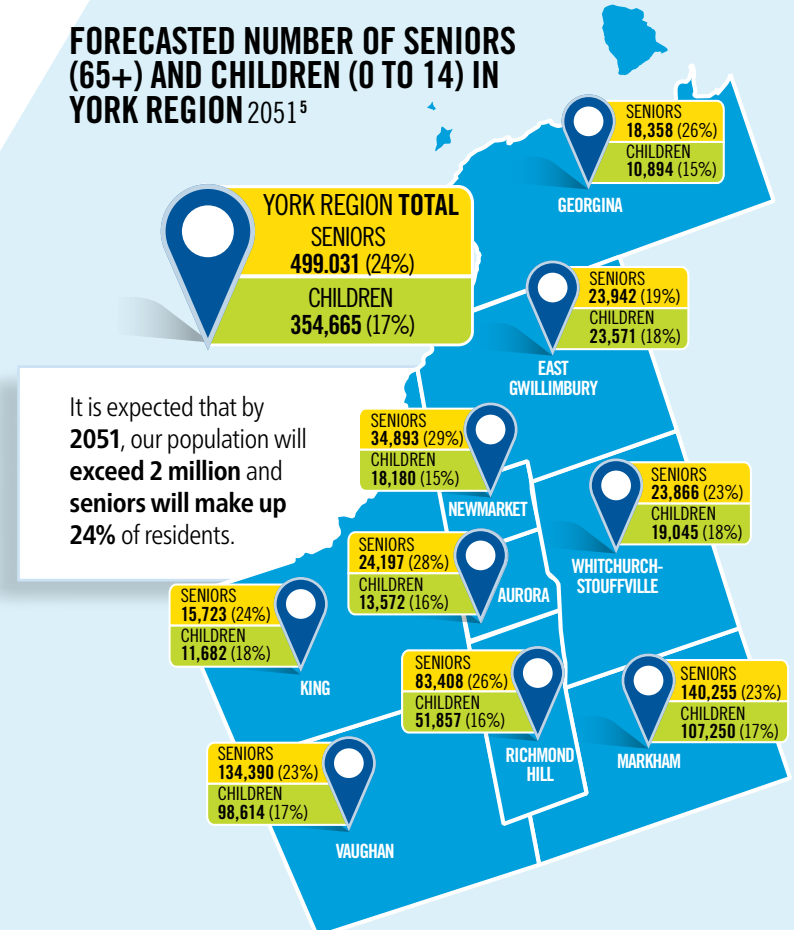
Definition: Men+ includes men, boys and non-binary persons: Women+ includes women, girls and non-binary persons.

While there are now more **seniors over 65 than children 14 and under** living in York Region, as our communities will continue to **grow and change**, we must think about how we serve residents at **every age and stage of life**.

FORECASTED NUMBER OF SENIORS (65+) AND CHILDREN (0 TO 14) IN YORK REGION 2051⁵

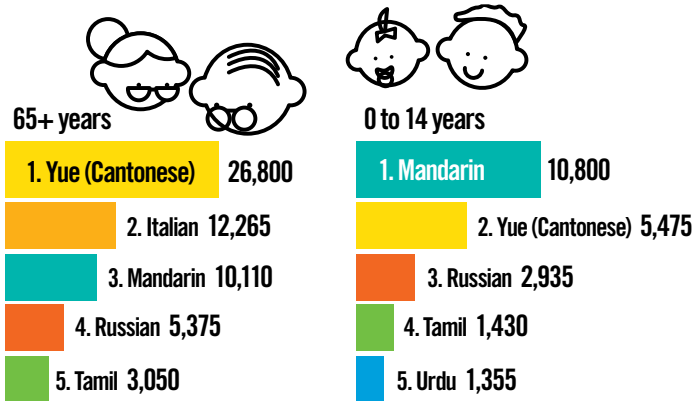


It is expected that by **2051**, our population will **exceed 2 million** and **seniors will make up 24%** of residents.

Diversifying

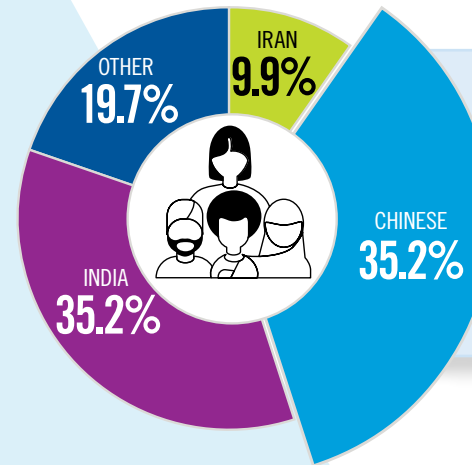
There are **more than 120** spoken languages and **230** distinct ethnic origins in York Region, enhancing cultural responsiveness is essential to establishing inclusive services that meet **diverse needs**.

Overall, **30.8%** of York Region's **population** speak a **non-official language** most often at home. Of those, **almost half (48.6%)** speak a **Chinese language**.

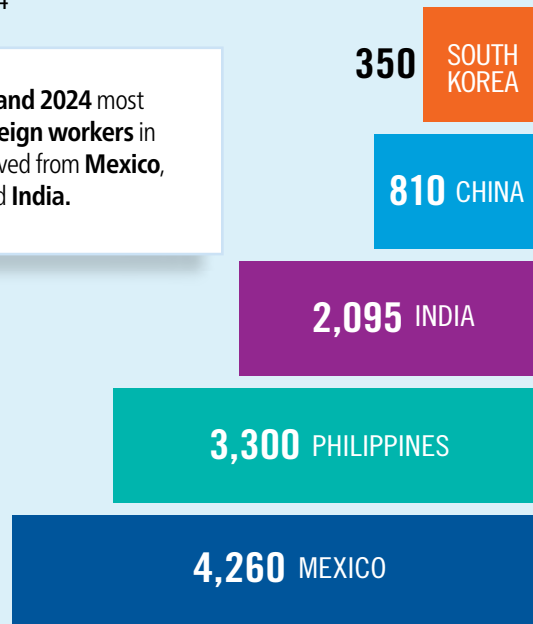
TOP THREE RACIALIZED GROUPS IN YORK REGION AS PERCENT OF THE TOTAL POPULATION 2021⁸



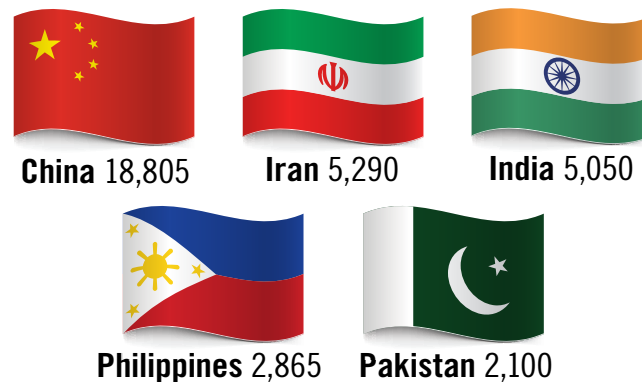
The **2021 Census** indicated **Markham** had the **highest proportion of racialized population** in Canada with **82.1%** of residents belonging to a visible minority group.

Between **2019 and 2024** most **temporary foreign workers** in York Region arrived from **Mexico, Philippines** and **India**.

Of **recent immigrants** in York Region, the largest share (**35.2%**) are from **China**, followed by **Iran (9.9%)** and **India (9.4%)**.

Demand for health and social services is increasing in York Region.

The 2024 York Region Health and Well-Being Review highlights population growth and shifting demographics that contribute to complex residents needs and increased service utilization, putting pressure on essential human services.

Collaboration and funding from seniors levels of government is essential.

The Region is one player in the human services system working with partners and funders to ensure the system and funding are responsive to our communities. However, local investments alone cannot meet the increasing demand for services. As service needs continue to grow, additional support and sustained funding from seniors levels of government are critical to ensure communities receive the necessary resources.
