

FACIALS

SPA AND SALON SAFETY CHECKLIST



- The spa/salon is inspected by York Region Public Health
- A green Proof of Public Health Inspection sign is posted at the spa/salon
- All work areas are well lit, clean and organized
- The service provider washes their hands before and after each service
- The service provider wears disposable gloves on both hands during the service
- The client's skin is checked for open cuts or wounds and signs of infection. If found, service is refused
- Tools, work surfaces and equipment are cleaned and disinfected after each client and are in good repair (e.g., no rust, cracks, etc.)
- A clean set of reusable equipment and instruments is prepared prior to service
- The following list of items are used on one client only, then thrown away
 - Face/cotton pads, sponges
 - Needles and lancets for extractions
 - Scalpel blade used for dermaplaning
 - Wooden applicator
- The following list of items are cleaned and disinfected between each client
 - Bowls
 - Diamond microdermabrasion tips
 - Double-loop comedone extractors
 - Facial brushes (silicone, synthetic)
 - Facial machine canisters
 - Jade/rose quartz, gua sha facial tools
 - Machine attachments
 - Reusable scalpel handles
 - Spatulas
 - Tweezers
- Tools and supplies are stored in a clean area (e.g., in covered containers)
- Needles and lancets used for extractions are in new, pre-packaged sterile packaging and are opened in front of the client
- Clean sheets, towels, robes etc. are used for each client. Paper liners are thrown out after each use
- Products, such as creams and lotions should be dispensed with a pump or single-use applicator to prevent contamination of the original product (no double dipping or fingers in jars)



Tip: Contact with blood and body fluid is common during facial service. It is important that your service provider wears new disposable gloves, discards them after service and practices frequent hand hygiene.

REMEMBER!

Serious infections can be spread during service if these safety practices are not followed.
